# Swifts

Swifts have been steadily declining in Wales and the UK and now they are on the red list, meaning they are officially at risk of extinction!

**There has been a 69% decline in numbers since the mid-1990s**

## Swifts need your help!

Modern buildings and building refurbishments mean Swifts are losing their nesting sites across the country.

Swifts only really spend any length of time on land when they are breeding. They eat and sleep in flight. They over-winter in Africa and return to Wales from mid-April onwards and nest in the same place every year

## Our Community & Town councils can help!

Loss of nesting sites is the main reason for their decline.

We need to retain/create nesting sites across Wales.

Can you identify potential sites in your communities for a Swift nest box?

Can you spread the word in your communities so that residents can install Swift boxes too?

## There are some locations that are ideal for this:

- An area where Swifts have been sighted.
- Ideally not South facing (not too much sun)
- At least 4.5 metres from the ground
- Sheltered, under the eaves of a building for example.
- A place where they won't be disturbed.



## Are you doing building work/renovations?

New buildings or new roofs can incorporate 'Swift bricks', and holes in the fabric of the buildings to provide nesting sites too.

Please spread this important message to your residents also.

Your Local nature Partnership coordinator may have nest boxes available.
